

# **Fire Chief's Report** David Newton

With one (almost) structure fire and five wildland fires, 2023 was an average year for us. The single structure fire was a pile of oil soaked rags that spontaneously ignited. We were alerted to a fully involved house fire – fortunately it turned out all the smoke was being created by a smallish pile that was isolated in a garage on a concrete floor. Neighbors removed the pile from the garage and we brought fans to help clear out the smoke which had spread throughout the house. Of the five wildland fires, three were caused by lightning and two were human-caused.

Our once monthly "All Responders" training has continued to be useful and well attended. This year we added a segment where we (try to) quickly go over the logistics and communication of each call in the previous month to find ways to improve and acknowledge strengths.

Local training: Heavy patient lifting, bee response, communications refresher, new map program training, functional exercise of a motor vehicle accident, wildland refresher, complex incidents, "normalization of deviance", pump & roll practice, pumpkin use and drafting, tender operations at remote tank, backpack pumps, initial sizeup, daytime traffic management exercise, vehicle backing, exercising all extrication power tools, and Red Cross Assistance cards.

Outside training: One firefighter took a two-day course titled "Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program." Two firefighters completed a three-day course in Wildland Chainsaws.

Improvements this year: More retroflective material on vehicles to improve roadside response safety. Grant received for new radios in the vehicles. A great new homegrown mapping program to speed our response in the field - thank you Peter LaRue and Lee Dyal. Cochise County started using a new fire station/department alerting system that helps the 911 operators alert us more reliably.

I want to write a few words on two subjects that will delay our emergency response to your location:

First – Please call 911 before you call one of us individually. You may think that calling your favorite EMT or Firefighter first could bring help faster, but it will only slow us down.

Second – Mark your residence with house numbers clearly readable from the road. That means 4+ inch high white reflective numerals on a dark background. Your wonderful black wrought iron numbers on weathered wood are suitably rustic, but useless at night.

### EMT Chief's Report Alina Downer



2023 has been a great year to volunteer with Portal Rescue despite us always finding

new scenarios to troubleshoot. Our current group of members (firefighters, radio operators, EMTs and board members) are a wonderful collection of personalities that have really come together as a team this year - more than I have seen since I first joined Portal Rescue.


In addition to our usual EMT trainings and our new "all responders" trainings, we were very lucky to have Cochise College instructors come out to Portal to teach an EMT refresher course for four of us at very low cost last February. Some EMTs were also able to attend an EMS Conference in Ruidoso, NM, Cochise County's EMS in the Desert Conference, and a Pediatric Disaster Training at Tucson Medical Center.

We had several challenges with vehicles this year. Rescue 4's air conditioner had to be repaired in Sierra Vista, and then needed a new alternator. Rescue 233's kneeling air lift system had a leak that put it out of service briefly. Our fire chief has selflessly spent hours testing, diagnosing, ordering parts, and coordinating repairs for these issues and many other smaller problems and upgrades. Our rescue vehicles would not be in such good shape without him. Human repair and maintenance is where our EMT team excels.

Medical calls were fewer than last year's – just 33, with 2 calls squeezing in on the last week of the year. That is still slightly up from 2021's 29 calls, but it is nice to have data confirming that 2022's 55 calls per year is not the new norm! We made good use of the new heart monitor this year for the 8 patients with heart issues. The monitor was also used on a good number of our other patients as it has many functions including automatic blood pressures, SPo2 and etCo2 monitoring.

We have been able to offer three CPR training courses to the community this fall including one for the Apache school children and their parents. We still have many CPR training kits that were donated to us through the American Heart Association, Arizona Community Foundation and Douglas Fire. We will continue offering classes in 2024, so please reach out if you haven't yet had the chance to attend.

With several of our team being part-time residents, threatening to retire soon, or unable to respond due to distance or ill health, recruitment of new EMTs is sorely needed! It is very exciting that we finally have a potential recruit. Laura Stratton, one of our new community members, took the EMT Course through Pima College this fall. We hope to have her join our team this winter.

## Results of the Oct 4th National Wireless Emergency Alert System Test

On Oct. 4, 2023, FEMA, in coordination with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), conducted a nationwide test of the Emergency Alert System (EAS) and Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA). Locally, we performed a study to see how these alerts reached residents in the Portal and Rodeo area. Only the component transmitted from cell towers was studied, because that's one of the methods most likely to be used to alert for our local risks (ie: wildfires).



In summary, 65 observations were plotted, coming from Hilltop to Animas to Apache. No one in New Mexico had a negative report. Arizona had mostly positive reports, except from Paradise and the interior of Cave Creek Canyon. Several were surprised that their reliable WiFi calling did not receive the alert. *Cochise County residents who did not receive the alert should register their phone numbers with the county alerting system at:* https://www.cochise.az.gov/287/Emergency-Management

Alternative Alerts. Cochise County emergency managers use the WEA system just tested through an interface called IPAWS, but they also routinely use another system in parallel which can send alert messages to phone numbers which have been registered in advance. There are two main advantages to signing up for the county alert system: 1) The messages are directed to phone numbers so they will be delivered through your WiFi Calling service and land-lines, and 2) You'll get messages impacting our local area even though you are traveling somewhere else. Note: If you're relying on the internet and/or WiFi to deliver these alerts, you'll want a small Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS) on your in-home equipment to keep that running during power outages that can accompany wildfires.

Color-coded maps showing where alerts were received are available via email...just contact me.

### While you were sleeping peacefully...

.... Portal Rescue firefighters were hard at work.

At approximately midnight on Saturday, July 22, lightning ignited a small brushfire on AZ State Land, a few yards above private land, and a third of the way up the north slope of Limestone Mountain. Six firefighters and a radio operator awoke (or - in one case - stopped partying) and reported to PR station.

Two firefighters immediately took off up Foothill Rd. to size up the blaze. The distant light was small and seemed to move, provoking speculation that it could just have been a flashlight carried by some wildland wanderer. While other personnel returned to their homes, a single firefighter kept 'eyes on the fire' throughout the night. At dawn, flare-ups helped to pinpoint the location - fortunately, because absence of visible smoke would have precluded locating the fire later that day. At 6 am on Sunday, and despite sweltering temperatures (remember last July?), a small team of dedicated volunteers started the climb up the steep hillside, carrying drinking water and tools.



Upon reaching the fire, firefighters found 4-6 Sotols in various stages of combustion and covering an  $\sim 12 \times 20'$  area. Luckily, the soil was still damp from an overnight shower. Using hand tools, the team scratched a fire line around the perimeter and then hacked the Sotols apart, down to their cool parts, and encouraged hot parts to burn completely. At one point, the crew realized that contents of water packs were inadequate, and one person returned to the engine for more drinking water as well as an extra 2 gallons in a backpack water pump to make sure embers were dead. If the fire had not been extinguished that morning, it would certainly have spread up the hillside in the afternoon heat and breeze.

About then the team's pagers went off for a medical call, and they moved on to the next challenge.

We are fortunate to have such dedicated volunteers!

# Update on Firewise

A decision has been made to end Portal's formal relationship with



Firewise, U.S.A. Together with the group's founder and prior Chair (Debb Johnson), both the current Chair (Fire Chief, David Newton) and his assistant (Dinah Davidson) decided that formal association with Firewise was no longer necessary. Most local residents are familiar with the program, and with investments of time (1,478 hrs) and money (\$18,983.74) in 2023, members inside Portal's Firewise boundaries continue to more than meet the program's annual requirements. Thus, the formal program closes with our membership in good standing.

To ensure that the list of Firewise participants ('Firewisers') can be transferred easily to any volunteer wishing to restart Firewise, a new Firewise Google Group was established on 01/18/23, using email addresses previously held in a private account. (Addition to this group may still be requested from Dinah Davidson at dianewdavidson@gmail.com)

Timely messages about Firewise practices, fire insurance issues, and links to Firewise videos can still be posted periodically to members of this group (contact Dinah to do so), as well as to the updated Firewise page (https://portal-rodeo.com/fire-wise.html) on the local website. Firewise literature will still be distributed by local realtors and Sew What?. Dinah is also willing to organize responses to any requests for property assessments.

Newton and Davidson met with the County's new Emergency Management Director (Daniel Duchon) on 04/18/23 to introduce him to the Fire Station and discuss multimodal means of communicating emergencies to community members. Flyers detailing how to sign up for emergency notifications from the County were made available at the PO and are available through local realtors.

Working with a local cartography expert, Firewise Committee member Lee Dyal (PR fireman for many years) drove hundreds of miles and spent hundreds of hours mapping and ground-truthing virtually all roads in the eastern Chiricahuas, western Peloncillos and intervening valleys, and recording road conditions and all associated structures. Maps are now accessible on cell phones of all PR's emergency personnel and will serve both medical and fire operations of Portal Rescue for decades to come.

Finally, earlier this year, USFS crews reduced dangerous fuels that had accumulated during years of fire prevention in local forests. Resultant piles of culled dead and cut vegetation in South Fork Canyon and the vicinity of Herb Martyr were burned during cold weather late in the year. Lack of precipitation may delay some of this burning until 2024.

### **Lighting strikes Portal**

October 24, 2023 was a memorable morning in Portal. An eerie orange light illuminated the overcast sky shortly after sunrise. Light rain was widespread, leading many to see a single or double rainbow against the backdrop of Cave Creek Canyon and Portal Peak. Lightning was also widespread. One bolt hit an agave plant near Sierra Linda Road, catching it on fire. Ziggy happened to be riding her bike in the area and saw the smoke; here is her account:

So I try to ride as often as I can in the canyon. On this particular day, it was a little harder because it had been pouring rain, but I gathered my gear and off I went. While I was driving to where I park on Cave Creek Road,




off to the left I saw a fire. I thought, "maybe someone is burning because of the rain," so I continued on but then I decided to back up. When I looked again I realized it was not a fire that someone was controlling. The ground was on fire! So I ended up driving to Cave Creek Ranch asking for a phone from Pedro, but I didn't have my reading glasses on so I couldn't call anyone. So I went to another house; the gal there called 911. Then I thought I should go find Reed because it was by his house. He asked if he could help me I said, "yes there is a fire close to your front yard." He looked and said, "yes there is," then he said that he would call Portal Rescue and take care of it. I have to say I'm glad it was raining hard and I was riding that day in the canyon. It is so beautiful and we all want to take care of it so as to preserve it for years to come.

Cochise County 911 alerted Portal Rescue to a "brush fire threatening structures." Marilyn went to the Station to be the Radio Operator. Aaron and Rolf took Brush 8 to the scene, meeting Alina there. Radio communication during this process indicated that a "cactus" had been struck and that Columbus Electric technicians working on Sierra Linda had used a fire extinguisher to put the fire out. By the time the brush truck arrived at the scene, the technicians were gone and there was no smoke to indicate the location of the fire. Ziggy showed up and was able to direct the firefighters to the site, which was just a few feet across and consisted mostly of burnt agave leaves and the firescarred agave stalk. Using hand tools, the firefighters put out the remaining embers and felt for hot spots. They cleared flammable material away from the burned vegetation, which wildland firefighters call "the black," to decrease the risk of spread in case the fire flared back up. The light rain that continued to fall further decreased the risk of spread.

Satisfied that the fire was contained, if not out, firefighters left the scene, encountering Reed as they left. Earlier, Reed had seen the technicians douse the fire and had called Cecil Williams to inform her that there was no danger. The fire was closest to her house and is now officially known as the Williams fire. Cecil remembers hearing loud thunder but it seemed to come from a different direction, so it is unclear if she heard the bolt that started the fire.

This incident is a good reminder about how quickly fire can threaten our community. It is important that residents respond quickly while ensuring their own safety. Ziggy learned from this experience that there is a land line telephone in the laundry room at Cave Creek Ranch. If she had known this at the time, she could have headed straight there to call 911. We appreciate Reed and Columbus Electric for their actions on this memorable day.


